The T-ronto tory plan of charging the expenses of the Chicors spree to "dusters" and "colonization roads" has been transferred to Ottawa and adopted there with some improvements. The recent blue books show that Sir Charles Tupper's travelling expenses to England and British Columnia, \$9,100, are charged to the Pacitic railway, but not to the syndicate, as some will say they might have been: that Si A. T. Galt's travelling expenses in Manitoba, \$1,500, an extravagant ligure, are set down to "surveys," which is very peculiar. More singular still is the payment f \$3,370 to the tory Minerre of Montreal for printing the report of the chief envincer of capals, and which was diefeed into two sums and charged to the capital accounts of the Welland and Lachine canals. Sarnia Observer: "Settlers in North-west are indignant over the increase of duties on waggons and implements, and refuse to find consolation in free sawdust and sausage shins, uncleaned. Sir Leonard Tilley might try them with the stuffed kind, cleaned, and see how it would work.

A sensational story came from Bermuda about a fire in the Princess Louise's room, which endangered the princess's life. The story was greatly exaggerated. A correspondent writes that the sleeping room occupied by the princess has a small fire-place, and one night a live coal hopped out of the grate and set fire to the wood-work. The princess called some attendants, and in about two minutes they put the fire out .... A small bomb exploded in Boston on the day the Marquis of Lorne reached there to meet the princess and the first report favored the marquis with a "very narrow escape."

The official return of the Muskoka election shows very clearly how that constituency was carried. In October last Bettes was elected by a majority of 415, the vote being: Bettes, 1,882; Prowse, 1,467. nethods and environments for the education our little girls has received some discussion of late and some time ago an informal meeting was held regarding the matter. As a result an adjourned meeting was held in St. Andrew's hall, over Itay's store, on Friday evening last. There was a fair attendance of leading citizens. Mr. S. A. McMurtry having been voted to the chair. Dr. Burrows was called upon to explain his reasons for convening the meeting. He stated that he had acted at the request of other parties, some of whom he was glad to see present, and who considered with him that the subject being one of common importance should be openly and fairly discussed. With this object in view he had taken such steps as would call those more particularly interested together. It was not a meeting of one section, as a great many invitations had been sent out. A number of letters were read, principally relating to the kindergarton system of teaching. A general discussion followed, throughout which the general desire was expressed for separate female school accommodation, at least that a choice be given that those wishing to avail themselves should have the opportunity granted them and that as well in connection with our common school system. Mr. J. D. Flavelle proposed a motion representing the importance of the more careful supervision of the morals and behavior of our little ones, not only during school hours and in the school room, but outside on the school grounds as well, also the importance of a better separation of play-grounds, which was carried manimously, and a committee was appointed to present the resolution and represent the views of the meeting to the school board at its earnest meeting. The members of the school board are anxious to serve the best interests of their censtituents, and we understand many of them agree with the views expressed at the meeting. The result of the conference will no doubt be satisfactory and lead to such changes as will be agreeable to all. It is generally agreed that even with present arrangements improved and increased accommodation is a necessity and perhaps the school board may be led to erset such additional building as may be required in some central situation.
