1. Your petitioner is a person who roted and had a right to vote at the above

(1). That other persons on behalf of the said Duncan John McIntyre did give, agree and promise to give money and valuable consideration to voters, in order to induce such voters to vote at the said elec-

(2). That other persons, on behalf of the said Duncan John McIntyre, did give, agree and promise to give money and valuable consideration to voters in order to induce them to refrain from voting at the said

(3). That other persons, on behalf of the said Duncan John McIntyre, did offer and promise certain persons, to procure or endeavour to procure office for some other persons, in order to induce such certain persons to procure or endeavour to procure the votes of voters and the return of the said Duncan John McIntyre to serve in the legislative Assembly, at the said elec-

(4). That other persons, on behalf of the said Duncan John McIntyre, did agree and promise to pay the travelling expenses, cab and railway fare of voters, and compensation for their loss of time in going to and returning from voting, in order to induce such voters to vote at the said elec-

(5). That other persons, on behalf of the said Duncan John McIntyre, did hire and pay, and promise and agree to pay, cab, railway and other conveyances to bring voters to and from the polls, in order ot induce such voters to vote at the said

(6). That other persons on behalf of the said Duncan John McIntyre did corruptly offer, promise and agree with certain voters and others to permit said voters and others to participate with the former persons in moneys expected to be won by the former persons, in bets made by them, dependant upon the return of the said Duncan John McIntyre, in order to induce such latter voters and persons to procure and endeavour to procure the votes of voters and the return of the said Duncan John McIntyre to serve the Legislative Assembly, at the said election.

(7). That the said Duncan John McIntyre had actual knowledge of and consented to the commission by others of the corrupt acts set forth in the preceding sub-sectione, 1, 2, 4,5, and 6 of this paragraph and committed similar acts personally.

(8). That the said Duncan John McIntyre did offer and promise to certain persons to procure and endeavour to procure office for some other persons in order to induce such former persons to procure and endeavour to procure the votes of voters and the return of the said Duncan John Mc-Intyre to serve in the Legislative Assembly, at the said election.

(9). That in consequence of such offer, promise, procurement and agreement, in the first clause of the last preceding sub-section mentioned, the said persons promised and endeavoured to procure the votes of voters and the return of the said Duncan John McIntyre to serve in the Legislative Assembly, and by such corrupt endeavours and procurement materially influenced the result of the said election. WHEREFORE your Petitioner prays that it

may be determined that the said Duncan John McIntyre was not duly returned and that the election was void. -12-3.


