Mr. Barron went on to question the advisability of the on-education of the sexes, while wishing it understood that he was not attacking in any way the morals of our schools. He would insist on Dr. Burrows making an explanation regarding the general charges advanced by him.

Mr. Pilkie hoped the committee appointed to look into the matter would consider his suggestion.



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

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
