[Correspondence of The Post.] STRUCK BY LIGHTNING, The house beonging to Mr. Edwin Glass was struck by lightning on Wednesday morning of last week about seven o'clock causing considerable damage, tearing to elivers seven or eight rafters, completely clearing the plaster off the ceiling of the second flat. knocking two chimneys to pieces, but forunately causing no loss of life to the famialthough one of the boys was in bed at he time where the room was entirely cov ered with plaster and lath. The members of the family were at breakfast; hey all felt the shock but are all recover-It is hard to account for the escape the boy in bed, on the second flat where the ceiling was all torn to pieces, unless the feather bed he slept on acted as a non-conductor to the electric shock. This may account for it. It is also strange that he other members of the family taking breakfast on the first flat, where there cannot be found any marks of the charge, were the parties who suffered the most from its effect. It took all day before they came to their natural feelings. It also appeared that there were several or more than one charge of the electric fluid, for the barn stands about four or five reds from the house, and in the barn two horses were killed at about the same time, or not tive minutes after. The barns did not show scacely any marks caused by the lightning although both horses were killed standing in two separate stalls close together.
