The particulars of the charges under the South Victoria election petition have been delivered to the respondent; but the petitioner was evidently afraid to come up to the scratch, as the "whites" did not connect the "blacks" with the "blacks". A summary order was conveniently obtained for the further particulars, which must be given today. As the matter is before the court we do not make any comments. The case comes up for trial on Monday, July 10th, before Judges Patterson and Ferguson.

PETERBORO COUNTY ON BOUNDARY BRIDGES.

They have in the Peterborough county called a special meeting of householders and ratepayers with a neighboring county. We have already on more than one occasion manifested our opposition to their callings, and their proceedings at the recent June meeting affect, we regret to say, two-thirds of this otherwise excellent community. From Kinnaird in Peterborough there are a number of bridges on or along the boundary, and constituting the boundary road. This road has for many years been the great thoroughfare from Peterborough to Bancroft, and further north; and to its maintaining this county has always, without diminution or shortening any unfeelingness, contributed its quota share. It has always happened, however, that the road has been far more extensively used by the people of Peterborough county, and the expense has been of the greater benefit to Peterborough towns. Certain popular men are now considered advocates of boundary bridging, and our council voted over the demands, instructions, contingent upon Peterborough paying its share, and in the event of a refusal to take the necessary action in the meantime, the Peterborough county council therefore adopted the following clause in the terms of its first and hedge committee:

"That no action be taken in the matter of the petition forwarded by the county clerk of the county of Victoria concerning the repairs and maintenance of the boundary road, and that we abstain from authorizing it to demand any action taken by the county of Victoria in this matter."

This is a fine exhibition of municipal meanness; but three paragraphs further down we find this clause, which is, under the circumstances, as safe and steady as anything we have seen this season:-

"That the county shall notify the county of Victoria that the approach to Peterborough by the county of Victoria is out of repair and maintenance, and that the county of Victoria is not entitled, and unless it is done this county will not reward any money of the said bridge."

Peterborough county is bound in honor, let fate play in its hands, to contribute its share to the maintenance of the bridges on the boundary line; and in view of their party calling and narrow policy they cannot expect this county to do otherwise than look very kindly indeed into every item of expenditure in connection with these bridges, and will look at any and every reasonable method of dealing with the case under the strictest economy.

This county will have to do full justice to these bridges if we have to maintain them, and charge half and twice to every Peterborough taxpayer. This would bring our estimate to their amount. But we believe the cost of repair, taking account, liberal, conservative view of the case, will decide that Peterborough must pay.

The North Ontario electric car has been purchased, interestingly of the agents or agent of Mr. Martin. It is understood his extensive ground for business is the choice of Tim Grier, but that will not hold water. Mr. Martin feels that he has no care, and besides no time to go over.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Mr. Mickey, one of the members of that body, has been appointed Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, to succeed Gov. Arthurdale, whose term expires on the 1st of July. The Cobourg Whig has, in consequence, over Monday and other political topics, so badly roused the Cobourg Review that the latter has, as a last resort, raised up implications that the former is a "liver" and other related terms. The Review has evidently evaded these charges through the well known skill with having nothing and cleverly foisted its antagonist.

Mr. Norquay is now exceedingly anxious to have a convention of provincial delegates to discuss the revision of the British North America Act, "with a view to secure greater harmony in legislative legislation in the federal and provincial legislatures respectively, and also arrangements of the sources of revenue so will render a uniform basis upon which to base the revision of the provinces." He has brought in a resolution for the concluding part of which we make the following quotation:

If it is agreed that a convention has been called for the consideration of an affair relating from Cornwall to Sainte-Ste-Marie, there to connect with the Northern Pacific, which will be extended to that point. The Northern Pacific is said to be backing the project. The St. Lawrence is to be bridged near Cornwall, and the new link will afford the shortest route from ocean to ocean. The Canadian Pacific maintains we said to be greatly disturbed at the intelligence, as it will give them a formidable competitor.

The representative interviewer of the enterprising Winnipeg Sun met Mr. S. C. Wood, in the prairie capital the other day, and had a conversation on the politics of this province. It will be found on our sixth page, Mr. Wood says his successor, Mr. Young, is a farmer. That is true; but that is not his only claim to distinction. He is a successful and progressive farmer; but he was an enterprising, able and progressive editor, and as such he received cordial support from the farmers. Most editors are good farmers and some of them, such as the Cobourg World, are well-edged butchers.

In the West Northumberland local election a certain deputy returning officer refused to allow a voter to take the required oath by which he would have been enabled to vote at the recent election. The penalty for an act in laid down in the election law as \$20. A suit was entered against the returning officer official, and the case came on a few days ago at Cobourg. Judgment was given for the plaintiff for the full amount of the penalty. That suffices to suffice as a warning to those returning officers to carry out the law, instead of trying to bluff voters from the polls, remarks the Port Hope News.
