At Lindsay and within St. Andrew's church there on Tuesday, 25th September, 1883, at 11 a. m., the presbytery of Lindsay held an adjourned meeting and was constituted by the Rev. A. Currie, M. A. There were present eight ministers and two elders. The minutes of former meeting were read and sustained. An extract minute from Toronto Presbytery was read approving of the union of Quaker Hill and Mount Albert congregations, agreeing to the supply of Quaker Hill congregation by Rev. Mr. McDonald of Mount Albert till the sanction of the union by the synod is obtained, and their decision is given as to which presbytery the united congregation should belong. After conversation on this point the matter was left over to next meeting of presbytery. Mr. Soott to remain moderator of Quaker Hill session meantime. Deputations reported their visits to the mission field and supplemented congregations, and grants were requested for the ensuing year from the home mission board. Appointed Rev. D. McDonald and the clerk to arrange with Mr. McCrae, student, to supply the north mission field for the winter. Mr. Patterson and Mr. Matthie reported their visit to Brown's school house. Their report was received and ordered to be engrossed and the thanks of the presbytery tendered to the deputation. The case was allowed to lie over till the Nov.meeting. The session records of Lindaa, congregation were examined and certified as carefully and correctly kept. The presbytery took up the resignation of Rev. James Hastie, of the pastoral charge of Mt. Rev. James Hastie were then heard and also Mr. Skinner and Mr. Matthie, when it was moved by Mr. Cockburn, seconded by Mr. R. Irwin, and agreed, that the resignation of Mr. Hastie be accepted, to take effect on the end of October. The clerk was appointed to preach on the flust Sabbath in November and declare the church vacant. The supply of the pulpit was left in the hands of the session during the vacasey.
