-The suspicion in the trade that the estimate of the French wheat crop made by the recent congress held at Vienna was far too low, has it seems not been without foundation, as the press cable despatch Monday gave the official estimate at 285,000 000 bushels; which is about 5,000,000 bushels more than that of the Vienna congress and 45,000,000 bushels more than that made by the Paris Bulletin des Halles. This is no suprise to the trade, as parties having correspondence with grain houses on the continent stated most emphatically that the enormous deficits in the yield, as previously cabled over, were absurdly exaggerated. One of our mer-chants gave it as his opinion that the estimate of the Vienna congress was a de-liberate concoction in order to further the interests of a certain class of operators Be that as it may, the congress referred to has certainly become amenable to very grave suspicions. The course of the wheat market in Europe since the estimates were first published clearly demonstrated their absurdity, for had there existed any valid grounds for believing them approximately correct, they would have overridden all considerations of full supplies in sight, and prices would at once have been affected thereby. We question if underesti-mating the yield of wheat has not been in vogue in this quarter of the globe as well.
