LENNOX REDEEMED.

Mr. Allison has carried Lennox by a majority of five. Though small in itself the majority indicates a decided change from the 38th majority secured for Sir John Macdonald by Roe and his two dollar bill.

THE NEW MINISTER OF EDUCATION.

The long expected retirement of the Hon. Adam Cooke from the department of education has taken place, and Mr. Mowat has offered the vacant portfolio to Mr. Geo. W. Ross, who has accepted it.

A desperate effort will be made to defeat Mr. Ross, but he and his friends are confident of success. Mr. Mowat is to be congratulated upon the selection he has made for minister of education.

Mr. Ross has the most important department next to that of the premier and he will be on his mettle for the next year or two.

THE NEW TIME-TABLE.

The new Midland time-table is giving general satisfaction to Lindsay and the district, as far as can be judged from a week's experience. The full statement in THE POST last week was much appreciated by the public.

The new time-table restores to Lindsay in a very large measure its important and material advantages as the central point on the railway system.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Moussou "mount-go." The writs have been issued for elections for the Ontario house in West Simcoe, Cardwell and West Middlesex.

Mr. J. E. Ross, a successful Toronto barrister, has been appointed to the vacancy in the common pleas division caused by the elevation of Mr. Justice Osler to the court of appeal.

Mr. Justice Armour is to try the South Simcoe Dominion election case at Barrie on Monday, Dec. 10, at 10 a.m. The West Northumberland case, affecting the seat for the same house, will be tried at Cobourg by Mr. Justice Cameron on Monday, 7th January next.

The York still moves. In the county council of York a motion to abolish toll-gates within the county was defeated by a majority of only ten.

The Brantford council decided the other day that the city ought to have a hospital. Whereupon Mr. J. R. Stratford, a wealthy and public spirited citizen, offered to give \$25,000 towards a building and Mrs. Stratford and Mrs. Hardy (wife of Hon. A. S. Hardy) offered to furnish the building.

The Dominion election in gerrymandered West Middlesex is to take place on Friday, Dec. 14, the same day as the local election. The conservatives have nominated a Dr. Rooms, and evidently intend to make Banker Johnston's five dollar bill cover a vote for each candidate.

Kingston Whig—"We are assured by the Tory papers that Sir Richard Cartwright's return to the house of commons will add nothing to the strength of his party. If this be the case, what is the cause of their outcry against him?"

EVENTS OF THE WEEK.

Three young ladies attached to the imperial court have been arrested in St. Peterburg for connection with a nihilist conspiracy. O'Donnell's trial to-day will be presided over by Mr. Justice Denman, and is expected to be short, as there are only thirteen witnesses in all to testify.

Over thirty arrests have been made in Dublin during the past fortnight on charges of conspiracy to destroy property by explosives and connection with the Fenian Brotherhood. The report of the capture of Marston by Sir Robert Balfour, and the capture of the Fenian officers detained to accompany Sir Robert Balfour, has been a source of joy to all. All the English non-commissioned officers in Egypt have volunteered to go to the front.

It was a slight for the gods to see Chasley Macintosh, M. P. of Ottawa, leaving a horse in the suburbs of Niagara last Sunday night with a \$2-ton cat under his arm and a \$1.50 grey kitten in his pocket.

Port Perry has gone through the ordeal of an extensive fire, causing heavy losses. There will be much sympathy for the towns and the people who lose. The burnt blocks will no doubt be rebuilt at once.

Notice is given in the Orange Sentinel that the grand lodge committee have decided to have an application made at the next session of the Dominion parliament for an act of incorporation. The Sentinel expresses the hope that "our brethren in every constituency in the Dominion will take immediate steps to ascertain the views of their representatives, and, if possible, secure their support for the bill."

The imperial crown prince of Germany has visited Alphonso at Madrid, and France is actually less warlike. But the signs of the times portend another big war between France and Germany, with probably Austria and Italy on the side of the latter and Russia on the French side.

On our sixth page will be found a graphic account of the "False Prophet's" great victory in Soudan over the Egyptian forces commanded by Hicks Pasha. The consequences of this disastrous defeat of the latter are likely to be very serious.

We publish elsewhere the prospectus of THE WEEK, the new high-class paper to be published weekly in Toronto, to fill the field of the Bytander and the old Nation. It has an able and an experienced editor and a strong core of contributors, including Mr. Goldwin Smith, Mr. J. C. Dent, Mr. Houston, Mr. John Reade and many others.

For Mr. Moussou is drifting into hopeless political inactivity in Quebec. He cannot control the situation. The odium of Mr. Chapleau's transactions and the weakness of several of his own jobs are too much for him.

Hamilton Times: Mr. Meredith said in his Barrie speech that it "was a high-handed, unjustifiable proceeding" for the Mowat government "to make war upon a neighboring province by taking possession of Rat Portage, though he admits that in his opinion Rat Portage is a part of Ontario.

The West Huron reform convention last Friday unanimously decided to accept the resignation of Mr. McMillan in order to open the riding for Sir Richard Cartwright. This step was taken in accordance with an arrangement made at the general election that a "divided" constituency should be placed at the service of the reform leaders if found necessary.

A boat exploded at the Levant mines on Wednesday, Nov. 28. The explosion of the mine, had a big blow off and his body injured. He was taken to Kingston and placed in the hospital, where he died the same night.

The Orangemen are making strenuous efforts to prevent the proposed land league meeting at Newry next Monday. If successful they propose to hold a simultaneous meeting on their own account, and the league have issued circulars inviting leaders for the purpose of 3,000 Orangemen at that place from Saturday to Monday. It is probable, however, that both meetings will be proclaimed.

The Campbellford Herald deals in weather prognostications. It has been observing certain signs and gives the result. Moisture is set in a hurry to build their houses this fall. The ground has not dried up as yet. Christmas gales will prevail in the winter. The corn stacks are light. Mailed ducks are thin feathered. The goose's breast bone is very delicate. Tomatoes ripen late. Cabbages hides are not thick. If these are not signs of a mild winter, says the Herald, the doubter is referred to Vomer or DeVoe.

Saturday midnight the grocery store of Peter S. Hicks, next door to the post office in the Campbell street, was discovered on fire. The fire brigade turned out promptly, and after two or three hours work succeeded in confining the fire to the west wing of the hotel block, which is a three-story brick building, although the main body of the hotel was badly damaged by fire and water. The hotel had just been extensively repaired. Loss of the building is probably \$14,000; loss on hotel contents, \$5,000 or \$6,000. Some of the inmates had narrow escapes. One converted traveller lost fur samples worth \$2,000.

Lord Rossmore's commission as justice of the peace in county Monaghan has been suspended, owing to his action on the occasion of the Orange and League meetings at Roslea, county Fermagh, on Oct. 16th. The lord commissioner of the great seal, in a letter to Lord Rossmore, charge him with endangering the public peace by leading the procession of Orangemen in close proximity to the league meeting, despite the remonstrances of the magistrate and the police. The letter concluded by demanding an explanation. Lord Rossmore has replied to the effect that he was unable to control the Orange procession, which he says, insisted upon marching straight to the place of the league meeting. He says he is convinced that his action at Roslea was the most practical manner of responding to Mr. Gladstone's appeal to the wealthier portion of the Irish people to help themselves.

Great excitement prevails at Newry owing to the hostile feeling between Orangemen and nationalists in consequence of the government placing Newry under the peace preservation act. The nationalists have resolved to hold their meeting on Sunday outside the town, and the Orange placards have been torn down. Many telegrams received at Dublin from the north of Ireland express the deepest indignation at the suspension of Lord Rossmore's commission as justice of the peace. Linen-ette's commission have returned to pass the bill for £1,500 to pay for extra police brought in to prevent disorder on the occasion of the recent land league meetings. Objection was made that the justices had not declared an auxiliary force necessary, therefore the expenditure was not properly authorized. A correspondent says that Mr. Kerrigan is trying to induce Cardinal Macdonnell and Sir James to urge the American bishops to take concerted action in regard to the Irish agitators in America. The two cardinals are not disposed, however, to make political religion. He is willing to speak privately to the individual bishops on the subject. A number of magistrates in Ireland have deposed Mr. Gladstone's resignation in consequence of the suspension of Lord Rossmore.
