VERULAM AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY .- A neeting of the members of the Verulam agricultural society was held in the town hall on Saturday and was more largely attended than any meeting for a very considerable time. The president, Mr. Alex. Robertson, occupied the chair. A lively interest was manifested by every one, and the various subjects that were brought up for discussion were well and sensibly considered. Mr. J. T. Robinson introduced the question of purchasing seeds, not merely clover and timothy seeds but every kind required, as by buying in large quantities direct from the producer the members would obtain their seeds at a very great reduction on the ordinary retail prices. He also suggested a system by which each member would give his order to the secretary on a printed list which the secretary would furnish and it would then be known exactly how much to purchase. After a full discussion the proposal was adopted, and it was decided that the orders, together with the membership fee of one dollar, must be delivered to the secretary on or before the annual meeting, which takes place in January. course of this discussion it was incidentaly mentioned by Mr. Robinson that since the show, some few weeks since, he had obtained a hundred and ten new members. The next subject was the desirability of having a plowing match in connection with the society. The idea was warmly received and many suggestions were offer ed as to rules. Finally it was decided to have a plowing match next fall, the rules commodious kitchen put up and the front part of the house sheeted over again.....
Mr. R. Robinson has had the same done to his house in the village. Both residences present a far more finished appearance than subject, expressed his gratification with the increased interest shown by the meet-ing. The annual show for the last two years had been most satisfactory and en-couraging, still he was sure that when such fine results could be obtained by a few a much greater success was to be obtained if they all took an interest in it, and far greater benefit be derived to them-selves. Mr. Urr, in his remarks, thought it would be well if the farmers brought their sons along with them to these meetings. It would be better if the young men were allowed more fully to take one handle of the plow, as it were, and such a feeling were encouraged. The young men and the society would be mutually benefitted by their presence at the meeting. It was then proposed that the prize list for next year should be entirely recast and the live stock classified. It was agreed that this was necessary and that the directors should re-vise the list. Mr. Lithgow made a very good suggestion that no prize should be offered for grade males. It was desirable that none but thoroughbred males should be used, and the society should not encour-
