DARTMOOR-DALTON. LECTURE.-Rev. J. Calvert of Dalrymple delivered a very interesting and instructive lecture here on Monday night, Dec. 17th, entitled 'New Zealand and my voyage to it.' For nearly an hour the audience were entertained with an eloquent account of the lecturer's passage to and residence among the Maories of the sunny south. New Zealand was described as a land of greenwood, vegetation running riot, plains, valleys and mountains still being covered with verdure all the year round. As a grain growing country it was shown from statistics to be the finest in the world. A number of the principal towns were well described, Dunedin appearing to be the commercial centre and Wellington the political centre of the colonies. The climate, manufactures and strict attention. One interesting feature in connection with the lecture was the exhibition of a plant of Lauri-gum, which the lecturer brought with him from the colonies. The New Zealanders or Maories were not forgotten, their habits and mode of living, etc., being well described. The lecture closed with a prayer and a hymn. Mr. Gardner occupied the chair, introducing the lecturer with choice and suitable remarks. After the usual vote of thanks to interested parties a very enjoyable evening was brought to a close.
