which it appears that most of the small village schools have passed nearly as many pupils as did the public schools of Lindsay at either of the late entrance examinations, and I observe that the Port Hope Guide copies your remarks and adds: "Why don't you get better teachers, Mr. Poer?" By turning to the fyles of The Poer for 1830 it will be seen that the public schools of Lindsay under a different regime were amongst the very best in Ontario, as was shown by the success of our candidates at the entrance examinations. Now they rank amongst the worst in the country. It is correctly remarked that not only the pupils who fail to pass suffer but those in the lower forms as well, because there is no chance for promotion, but your correspondent seems to forget that with the present state of affairs it is only a question of a very short time till our high school will dwindle down for want of pupils since the public school is not sufficiently efficient to prepare them to pass unless indeed we choose to support a high school for the benefit of outsiders. 
