Hickson, manager of the Grand Trunk rallway, asking that the train service on the line from Whitby north to Lindsay be so altered as to give connection in the morning at Whitby with trains on the ment line for Toronto and greyming in the the main line for Toronto and returning in the the main line for Toronto and returning in the evening, in other words to restore the former system. It was further resolved to ask the council of the municipalities interested to severally memorialize. Will you kindly lay this letter before your council at its first meeting and advise me what, if any, action they may take in in the maiter.

Railway Notes.

The Ontario and Quebec railway bridge across the Otonabee at Peterborough cost \$38,

-Vice-president Harris of the Erichas accepted the presidency of the Northern Pacific in place of poor Villard. —It is quite likely that the Grand Trunk will be double-tracked from Toronto to Montreal next summer. They have already laid down a large quantity of rails at different places along the line, intended for a second track. At the Kingston station there are deposited about 20,000 rails, and a similar quantity at Gananoque.

The east-bound express Wednesday of last week was derailed while slowing up at Trenton by a switch spreading. There were two engines and five Pullmans full of members of pargines and five Pullmans full of members of par-liament, besides other cars, and they bumped along for two hundred yards, several coaches being thrown on their sides and one Pullman being turned completely over. No body was hurt; but if the train had been going at full speed there would have been great loss of life. Mr. Joseph Hickson, the Grand Trunk general manager, was on the train. A special train was made up and members of parliament sent on to Ottawa.

The Council of 1884. On Monday morning of this week the gentlemen of the council of 1881 met and subscribed he necessary declarations of office and of qualification. This little formality took place at the conneil chamber. Mayor Wallace then took the chair and made a brief speech, pointing out the responsibility devolving on the council to conduct the affairs of the town with economy and wisdom. Fire and Water.— Coun. Crandell, chairman; Dep.-reeves Meiville and Fee, and Couns. Graham. McTavish. Begley and Bryans.

Sanitary.— Coun. Weese, chairman; and Couns. Sinclair and Begley.

It was understood that this draft of the committees was to stand on approval of the council at the first meeting in February. The council then adjourned until 8 p. m., when a full board met and proceeded to business. Communications were read from Mr. Wm. Robson, asking a rebate of taxes on his store, which had been partly destroyed by fire. It was decided to make the reductionsshed. From Dr. Herriman about charity for an unfortunate person. Stewart, and after the preliminary business had been disposed of the chair was taken by Major Deacon and the programme proceeded with, Mr.R.A.Dickson delivered an essay on the "Dismissal of Lieutenant-Governor Letellier. He arrayed the facts of this unwarrantable procedure in a lucid manner; and dealt successively eedure in a lucid manner; and dealt successively with the partizan motives and unconstitutional means adopted by the Dominion government whereby a great man, the holder of the highest office in his province, the representative of the sovereign, and who had been supported by the franchise of the people, was dismissed without trial or cause assigned in deflance of all the principles of right and justice and at the beek of a ministry properly dismissed by his and of a ministry properly dismissed by him, and who were condemned by the vote of the people who were condemned by the vote of the people of Quebre. The debate was then called, the subject being "Manhood Suffrage." "Resolved, that the franchise should be extended to every man upon attaining manhood." Mr. Dunn for the affirmative (limiting his argument to parliamentary suffrage) claimed that it was unjust for one part of the community to exercise governing power over their fellow subjects, and showed that the position of a man without a vote was, in theory, no better than a serf or the subject of a despot like the exar of liussia. He argued that is every man what he rich or record argued that as every man, whether rich or poor, contributed his quota to the revenue of the country he should have a voice in its disposal, and maintained in an able manner the philosophical and moral right of every man to the franchise. Mr. G. H. Hopkins for the negative maintained that the matter should be contested squarely on both parliamentary and municipal issues. He argued that property should be represented; that the result of "manhood suffrage" would be a general uprising of the masses against the property holders, and a general division of spoils, illustrating his argument by referring to the evils of "manhood suffrage" in some of the American cities; and contending that the unrepresented classes could rebel if and maintained in an able manner the philosoph that the unrepresented classes could rebel if they were not obtaining justice from their rul-ers. Mr. Lees, for the affirmative, combatted the arguments of the negative and supported Mr. Dunn in his position. Mr. Skinner, for the negative, ill strated the position of the reform party towards the subject in a clear and fuent manner. Mr. Stewart closed the negative by an able review of the arguments advanced by the affirmative. As the the third speaker for the affirmative was absent the debate was then closed by Mr. Dunn. Major Deacon then re-viewed the arguments in a comprehensive man.
