ONTARIO LEGISLATURE.

THE DEBATE ON THE ADDRESS—MR. MERE dith's amendment—the government SUSTAINED BY A MAJORFTY OF TWELVE. The debate on the address continued up to Tuesday night. It was relieved by a remarkably able speech by Mr. Pardee, in which he badly cornered Mr. Meredith and the opposition several times. Tuesday evening Mr. Meredith moved an amendment to the sixth paragraph as follows:

"And we desire to assure your honor of our unabeted loyalty to and confidence in the federal system of government under which we live, and while we recognize the fact that in working out that system differences have arisen, and will necessarily arise, as to the respective limits of the federal and provincial jurisdiction, we feel assured that these differences may be adjusted by the exercise of a spirit of moderation and conciliation in the discussion of them, and that falling an agreement being come to the constitution provides ample means for their speedy and peaceful settlement. And we are of opinion that while we should firmly maintain the right of the provincial legislatures to regulate the traffic in intoxicating liquors, as they have heretofore exercised it, steps should at once be taken with a view to the immediate reference of the question of the constitutionality of the Dominion license act, and its effect (if any) upon the laws of the province regulating the traffic in intoxicating liquors, for determination by the proper legal tribunal having authority finally to determine the matter in controversy."

Mr. Meredith endeavored to create a sen-

Mr. Meredith endeavored to create a sensation by dramatically reading some telegrams sent from Rat Portage by Capt. Burden and Aubrey White to Hon. Mr. Pardee. Capt. Burden telegraphed as fol-

"Absolutely necessary that we should be placed in funds in some shape to meet pressing emergency. We can secure the local newspaper's support for five hundred dollars; half down and half after the election. Most important that this should be done at once, as the enemy is trying to secure it. Negotiation will be conducted by outside party."

It seems Mr. Pardee did not answer the telegram, and the conservatives bought the paper. Mr. Pardee remarked that it was all a mare's nest, and that the opposition could have an investigation up to the hilt. It comes out that one of John Shield's telegraph operators who recorded graph operators, who was also postmaster at Rat Portage, listened for the telegrams and took them off as they passed along. Mr. Meredith has a couple of dozen telegrams of this kind. grams of this kind.
