The Peterboro Review says that reform journals which often quote from "By-stander" will hardly quote the following in a recent number of "The Week".

The Review is dishonest as usual in making the extract. It leaves out the following part of the sentence: "I am sure the country will be benefited by the election of Mr. Downey."

People are complaining of hard times and stringent money. The government have been taking seven and eight millions a year too much—more than they needed.

Things have got so utterly bad in Quebec provinces that even the Montreal Gazette calls upon all parties to sink minor differences and unite to "save the province."

"In 1867 the old provinces started even, each having a clean blank sheet. Sixteen years have elapsed, and how do we stand? Ontario has a surplus of some six millions to the good."
