NORTH VICTORIA.

Decision in the North Victoria case has "saved," as the judges gave him the bene-At of a very doubtful "doubt." They clearly felt strongly disposed to declare the election void. They speak in very strong terms of the actions of "Gum Swamp" Anderson, "Squirrel Skin" and others of that gang; and of the extensive treating and drinking, in defiance of the law, In bringing the matter hefore the courte the peritioner was discharging a public duty, and he did so in an open and a manly way. He did not get an entirely irressommble and worthless person to enter the petition. The decision justifies his course, and anould prove a warning to all who are disposed to set the law at defiance. If the hotel-keepers break the law so flagrant-If an they did in this case it is quite likely that they will do so in other cases; and it will be the duty of the license inspectors to see that the regulations are properly observed. Probably they have been some what remies; but they will now so doubt discharge their duties with more zeal, energy and discretion.

HECTOR CAMERON, M. P., AND CROOKED' WHISKEY.

Many good men in North Victoria will be parted beyond description at the peculine relationship of Mr. Hector Cameron towards Vankes crooked whiskey; and many other good voters will be disappoint. ed beyond measure because Mr. Cameron did not make North Victoria astore-ground for the 2004 old bourbon from across the lines. A few barrels would have been very mandy to keep for the next election, if indeed it would keep so long. The American distillers have over-produced an enormous quantity, and have in vain sought an extension of their bonded term. One of their achemes was to get a great quantity stored in Canada for some time; and Mr. Hector Cameron, M. P., and the good and pious Mr. Bunting of the Mail, have been trying to help them by getting the regulations made sufficiently elastic or by securing a spactical evasion of the law. These schemes were partially auccessful, for some whiskey was brought into Canada. A recent partiamentury return gives some highly interesting correspondence, in which Mr. Cameron and Mr. Bunting figure in a way that is not very creditable. While Mr. Bunting was working heartily in the interests of the Yankes distillers the Mail newspaper, of which he is managing-director, was claiming the support of confiding temperance p ople for the government on the ground that they declined to senist the wicked Yankes distillers in their diabelical plans. The hypocrisy of the Mail and its managing editor was never more thoroughly exponed. From the re turns it would appear that the precious couple were industriously wire-pulling as the following epistle will show:
