-Damage to the amount of four thousand pounds was caused by the explosion at the Victoria railway station in London Tuesday morning week. Houses for a distance of sixty yards on either side of the station were badly damaged. The disaster is believed to have been caused by dynamite or nytro-glycerine and by the same persons who caused the previous explosion at Paddington. It is also reported that the explosion was premature, the dynamite having been intended to be used against the houses of parliament. The previous report of the number injured was exaggerated, only two persons having been slightly injured.

-- An infernal machine has been discovered at Paddington railway station, London. It was of American manufacture and contained dynamite. It was inside a value attached to a cash box, and consisted of a mass of twenty pounds of dynamite, in which was imbedded an American alarm clock and a pistol, the hammer of the pistol being elevated. The value was deposited in the cloak-room on Monday night. The compirators, it is believed, intended that the machine should explode simultaneously with that of the Victoria railway station. If it had exploded it would have done much greater damage than at the Victoria station, as the cloakroom is built under the hotel. The railway officials absolutely deny that any dynamite has been found underneath the station.

-A man named Heffron, who during the construction of the new Welland canal at Thorold a few years ago killed a fellow-workman in a quarrel, was arrested at Port Colborne one day last week for murder. Heffron escaped at the time of the killing and made his way to the Michigan pineries, where he has since worked and behaved himself in a respectable orderly manner. Becoming homesick he returned to Port Colborne to visit his parents, and stayed there several days, when he was arrested. The constable was taking his prisoner to Welland, and when at the depot the latter cleverly tripped up his captor and effected his escape, and no doubt is now safe in the United States. The alleged crime was almost forgotten except by the police authorities, who have constantly been on the look-out for his return, but have made no effort to follow him to the States.
