Business and Produce. Wheat and grain have not been con any quantity during the past week. The drop in prices in the American markets has affected local prices to the extent that spring wheat has fallen to \$1 and fall wheat to \$5c. Arnecta is out of consideration. American wheat is being brought in in considerable quantity and at rates something under local prices. Barley is quoted at 60c. without much prospect of change. In produce matters are more lively. Large quantities of eggs are being picked up. Dundas & Flavelle Bros. being the principal buyers. Prices are steady at 15c. Butter rules at 18c. to 30c. Potatoes, lic. to 50c. Hay it is just now between hay and grass-ranges from \$6 to \$5 per ton.

Montreal Live Stock Market. Hetween twenty-five and thirty cattle were offered at the Montreal market on Monday, which appeared ample for the demand, as only a few butchers were in attendance. Sales were made at ic. to 61c, per lb. for beasts that could not be classed as choice; medium to fair grades sold at 51c, to 51c, and lean, rough cattle at ic. to 41c, per lb. live weight. Only a few sheep and calves were offered. Choice shipping cattle were quiet, a few being reported sold at Acer's Kennedy's yards. Point St. Charles, at about last week's ligures. Live bogs were steady at 7c, per lb.

Montreal Horse Market. A good enquiry for horseflesh has been experienced during the past week, but the supply of desirable has scarcely been equal to it, and values have ruled high for the best offerings.
