The market for grain is dull, no more coming in than will supply the demand for local use. Prices are fair and as high as \$1.10 has been paid for good samples of spring wheat. Fall wheat remains at last week's figures..... Produce is in demand, and eggs, butter and garden beginning to move, but the outlook does not indicate that prices will be high. From 17c. to 19c. per lb is paid for average grades. The difficulty that local buyers have to contend with is that three-quarters of the wool offered is not properly washed. The fleeces have been given only a hurried cleansing, and consequently come to market in an unsatisfactory condition. Farmers having wool to dispose of should see that increased attention is given to this matter-one of the points that will pay. If the buyer has to cut down the price per pound on account of dirt, sand, grease, burns and thistles the seller has himself to blame.
