We learn by telegram that Mr. W. E. Tilley, headmaster of the Lindsay high school, has been appointed public school inspector of West Durham by the county council now in session at Cobourg.

The Quebec government have been compelled to appoint a committee to investigate certain grave charges against Judge Mousseau in dealing with contracts when premier. The government desperately resisted the motion of enquiry, but the case was so bad that a considerable number of their own supporters joined in the demand for an investigation.
