Owing to the sbeence of the president and the vice-president, on motion Mr. McBrien, inspector of public schools for Outsile county, took the chair at one p.m. Mr. Knight, impector for East Victoria, being present was invited to the platform. Mr. McBrien then introduced Mr. T. G. Campbell of the Whitby collegiate institute, who illustrated in a very pleasant, manner his method of wintoy conegiste institute, who interreted in a very pleasant manner his method of teaching arithmetic. That text books on history he divided according to reigns and dynasties as far as the end of the Stuart period and thence according to party government of fam Canadian history be taught for entrance examination in preference to British history, but this committee recommends in view of the short time for preparation between examinations that only one examination be held for admission to high schools during the

year, such examinations to occur in June, as this would permit of both Canadian and British history being taught. 6. That ancient history be not required for third and second class examinations, 7. That the text books on grammer are totally unsuitable, and we would recommend that a text book on the subject be prepared in harmony with "Campbell's Swinton's Language Lessons" and Abbett's "Have to Parse." 8. That a speller should be compiled containing the subject matter of "Cage's Practical Speller" and the important parts of the old Canadian speller, the companion to the readers. Mr. Orr of Whitby collegiate institute then addressed the association on the "Cultivation of a professional sentiment," after which Mr. Noble of Uxbridge presented the report of the committee on ways and means to raise teachers' salaries.
