IMPORTANT AND SUCCESSFUL MEETING.

Passing Resolutions that will Interest Us All.

READING OF MINUTES—ADOPTION OF ANNUAL REPORT—COMMITTEES—A REGULAR TRADE SALE—EFFORTS MUTUALLY SUCCESSFUL—FLATTERING RESOLUTIONS OF PUBLIC CONFIDENCE—GREAT ENTHUSIASM—MEMO. OF GOODS TO BE DISPOSED OF SPEEDILY.

Although the selection of a presidential candidate on the other side of the line; the question of the authenticity of Wiggin's dark moon; the proceedings of the county council are all important matters and have enjoyed the attention of the public, it is gratifying to find that a purely local institution is not without a claim. Much interest has been felt in the matter referred to and this week is offered a frank and free report of the regular communication of the Lindsay Dry Goods and Clothing Syndicate held in their office at the City Store, on Wednesday, the 18th June, 1884, when the following business was transacted:—

Meeting opened in regular form at 7.30 p. m., minutes of the last meeting read and confirmed. The President took the chair, and duly announced the order of business, with instructions to proceed at once. Annual report was read and unanimously adopted.

A FEW COMMUNICATIONS.

Communications were read from surrounding towns complaining of the low prices at which the Syndicate were selling Dry Goods and Clothing, thus drawing business from their respective towns which properly belonged to them. Communication from the C—Cotton Co., offering this Syndicate 50 bales Factory Cotton, 3 cases Cottonades, 2 Cases Ducks, 2 cases Denims, 5 cases shirtings, 5 cases Steam-wools, at a discount of 33 1/2 per cent. off their latest list prices, which they contend is the lowest price ever reached in the history of Canada. Communications from the L—Woollen Mills offering 5 cases Canadian Tweeds at a discount of 40 per cent. Communication from a needy importer who wants cash, offering three cases Dress Goods and one case of Fancy goods at 20 per cent less than the goods cost to lay down. The above communications were ordered to be laid on the table for further consideration.

INSTITUTING A TRADE SALE.

Moved by the Vice-President, seconded by the Secretary, and resolved: "that whereas, in consideration of the public's appreciation of our efforts to give them good and reliable goods at the lowest cash prices, we do accept and hereby agree to purchase the merchandise referred to above, and institute a regular trade sale for the term of sixty days from date, thereby giving the residents of the Midland counties an opportunity of supplying themselves with Dry Goods, Clothing and Carpets at less than manufacturers prices."

The Vice-President, in support of the above resolution remarked that as the public very kindly and justly appreciate our efforts in the past, that it would be doing them but justice now, when we have an opportunity, to prove to them in a pecuniary sense that our efforts and labors are mutually beneficial and in no other way can we so well substantiate our good intentions and appreciation of their kindness as by taking advantage of the existing depression and accepting these sacrifices and giving the benefit direct to our patrons. It would also prove two indisputable facts viz: The cheaper we can buy the cheaper we will sell, and our ability to handle large lines of goods, which is truly the secret tip of buying at inside prices.

COMMENCING AT ONCE.

Resolved, the goods be purchased at once, and a regular Trade Sale, in accordance with the foregoing resolution, be instituted on Saturday, the 21st of June, 1884, to be continued for sixty days, and that all goods throughout the City Store be remarked down to cost, and the balance of Millinery and Spring Mantles be closed out regardless of cost, together with all remnants.
