Coal on an Extensive Scale. It is gratifying to know that the already very large business carried on by Mr. R. Communications from the L- Woollen Mills offering 5 cases Canadian Tweeds at a discount of 40 per cent. Communication from a needy importer who wants cash, offering three cases Dress Goods and one case of Fancy goods at 20 per cent less than the goods cost to lay down. The above communications were ordered to be laid on the table for further consideration.

INSTITUTING A TRADE SALE.

Moved by the Vice-President, seconded by the Secretary, and resolved: "that whereas, in consideration of the public's appreciation of our efforts to give them good and reliable goods at the lowest cash prices, we do accept and hereby agree to purchase the merchandise referred to above, and institute a regular trade sale for the term of sixty days from date, thereby giving the residents of the Midland counties an opportunity of supplying themselves with Dry Goods, Clothing and Carpets at less than manufacturers prices.'

The Vice-President, in support of the above resolution remarked that as the public very kindly and justly appreciate our efforts in the past, that it would be doing them but justice now, when we have an opportunity, to prove to them in a pecuniary sense that our efforts and labors are mutually beneficial and in no other way can we so well substantiate our good intentions and appreciation of their kindness as by taking advantage of the existing depression and accepting these sacrifices and giving the benefit direct to our patrons. It would also prove two indisputable facts viz: The cheaper we can buy the cheaper we will sell, and our ability to handle large lines of goods, which is truly the secret tip of buying at inside prices.
