Of course it has its drawbacks as well as other countries. The want of wood is one of them, but one soon gets used to it. Coal is plentiful and will be very cheap, and wood can be had in limited quantities. Good wood can be had here now at from \$6 to \$6 s cord, which is not much higher than in some of the towns in Ontario. Business has been very dull here this spring—the want of rain was the cause—but now that the prospects are good for a splendid crop we hope to see business booming sgain. Everything is cheap here considering that we see four hundred miles from Winnipes, and the C. P. R. rates to contend with. Massy make the mistake of bringings lot of stuff with them, such as agricultural implements, etc., which are not suitable for the country, and can be had here as cheap as in Ontario. I have just returned from building two new dwellings, one for Mr. J. Small and the other for Mr. John Henderson, who came here this spring. They are very comfortably fixed, and are well pleased with their owntry. I must now bring this already too long letter to a close. If you think it of any interest you are at liberty to use it or any part of it you see fit. I could go on writing, but perhaps at some future time I may trouble you again.

Barron contributes to the cricket department of the sporting columns of the Globe the following referring to cricket and "sports" at Lindsay: "Cricket in Lindsay has fallen off We hope, however, that this is only for a short time. It would be a pity not to hear from this club this season after its excellent record of the last two years. The Lindsay ground, from its central position and shape, could be made one of the finest grounds in Ontario, and though it lacks the beauty that would be imparted to it by the presence of trees it secures by their absence that light which on so many prettler grounds is interfered with by shadow.....

The Lindsay town council very properly withheld from the promoters of the sports held in that town on the 24th ult. the grant it had agreed to give. The entire proceedings of that day, it appears, were most discrediable, and the town itself, through its conneil, was the first to show its appreciation of how sports should be conducted by peremptorily withholding the grant. The races were held upon the main street, and started in turn opposite different hotels, with what object it was not difficult to perceive. An hotel or two on a cross street were not to be overlooked, and so when their turns came the eyefor-business managers changed the course from a comparatively smooth to a comparatively rough course. Probably Lindsay has made its last grant of this kind and will employ its future grants of this kind in securing the permanent benefit of one good ground for sports of all kinds."

This is a case now pending in the chancery division of the high court of justice and is brought by David Jack of the township of Reach against his brother, Wm. Jack, who at one time resided in this town and carried on the business of a cattle-buyer, to foreclose a mortgage on land in Uxbridge given as a security for a \$1,000 note endorsed by David for his brother. Judgment was allowed to go by default against Wm. Jack, but there being executions against the lands of Wm. Jack in the sheriff's hands at Whitby a reference was directed to the master of the court, there to enquire what encumbrances there were against the land and to take the accounts. The execution creditors, through Mr. James Heap, their solicitor, by petition to the court contend that the mortgage is void as against creditors and as being given as a fraudulent preference and also that it has been paid. From the evidence already taken before Judge Dean in the matter it appears that Wm. Jack absconded from this province about July last and just before leaving he gave his brother David \$1,000 to take up the note with, for which the mortgage was given, which \$1,000 David deposited in a bank at Uxbridge on interest, and after it had laid there some short time it was withdrawn by him and the note taken up with it. After this Mr. Morgan of Ochawa, from whom. William had obtained \$1,000, as was alleged fraudulently, came to David and informed him that the \$1,000 he had got from William was part of his money and claiming it from David, and it not being then paid Morgan sued David for it, the case being set down for trial at the last Whitby assizes, but it was settled by David paying Morgan \$250 in cash and a promisery note for \$660, each party paying their own costs, Morgan promising not to prosecute William and David to try and get the money out of the land if he could, but if he could not second file suit to be brought for the \$250 on the money and note he had given.
