Montreal Live Stock Market.
Receipts of live stock at Point St. Charles

The receipts of the cattle this week were striking contrast to those of the previous week, this week. It is bad for all parties concerned that this should be the case, and the drovers should try and equalize the receipts more. The inactive demand last week with large receipts has brought about the present state of things. There were very few cattle in, and prices in consequence are firmer. Choice export lors are worth 51c to 6c per lb. Good butchers bring 11c to 13c per lb. ordinary 31c and inferior 3c. Sheep are in fair demand and steady at 11c to 11c. Lambs bring \$2.50 to \$3.50 a head. Calves steady at 3c to 9c per lb. dressed weight. Hogs in limited offer and steady at 51c to 6c per lb.

Montreal Cheese Market. The week has opened on a strong and active market, due mainly to decided speculative spirit, with which some dealers seem to be sed, Still, when it comes down to actual facts, the market is undoubtedly strong at the facts, the market is undoubtedly strong at the moment—even excited and buoyant prices showing a further advance of \(\)c. There were eager buyers, and all offerings were quickly taken up at the advance. Well-known factories brought 10\{\)c. and some holders went up to 10\{\}c. In face of the facts it will be useless to look for other than low prices, and unless the demand for export exceeds that now in view wheat will probably bring, in this county, during the comng fall, in the neighborhood of 98c. But with a large yield the farmers will not be badly off.

24 butchers' eattle, 6 butchers' sheep, and 3 hogs. The total experts to date are new 26,465 head cattle, and 16,955 sheep, against 27,925 eattle, and 32,331 sheep during the same period last year. Advices from the other side report that the first shipments of sheep met with a fair sale, and made money. The market for shipping eattle to-day was fairly active and steady, the general range being from 5c to 51c, but some exceptionally choice lots brought 6c per lb. live weight. One exporter purchased about 200 head at the above figures. Last year's prices were 6c and 61c. There was a fair demand for sheep for export on the basis of 41c for good lots. Live hogs were in better supply at 61c to 61c. At Viger market 250 head of cattle were received, for the best of which demand was good.
