ANOTHER KNOCK-DOWN. The full text of the judicial committee's decision completely disposes of the rubbishy criticisms of certain very organs and speakers over the finding that the award was not "legally binding." Their lordships report "that legislation by the Dominion of Canada as well as by the province of Ontario was necessary to give binding effect to the award of the 3rd of August, 1878, and that as no such legislation had taken place the award is not binding."

CHANGE IN TRAIN SERVICE. The recent change in the train service between Lindsay and Cobocook seems to have produced general discontent in North Victoria, as described in our Victoria Road correspondence. No doubt the reduction from double to single trip service was made in the score of economy, but on the other hand the change may have been experimentally made, and if the people more directly interested along the line put their case clearly before Superintendent Stephenson and Gen. Manager Hickson they may secure the revival of the former train service, if it can be made to pay in any way.

MR. JOHN H. LAKE, alluded to as a Mormon missionary in recent Cameron correspondence, has called upon us and shown credentials stating that he is a duly appointed missionary of the re-organized church of Latter-Day Saints. These claim to be the rightful successors of the original latter-day saints; and they condemn polygamy. We have also received a letter from Mr. Lake, who is apparently in favor of Mr. Lake, and speaking well of him, but it is too badly written that it would be impossible to decipher it without devoting more time to the task than we have to spare.

THE LONDON ADVERTISER usually remarks that "there is still a good deal of vice in the Dominion government. For years an old Irishman has made a living by keeping a fruit stand at the Ottawa post office corner, having been granted permission by the Dominion government. The other morning when she arrived she found her stand demolished and her means of livelihood taken from her by order of the government of Sir John. It may as well be understood that as long as the Dominion government is in power, the old lady will be unable to do anything, and she would appeal to the privy council, she would

"but the Dominion government higher than a life." "Grip" has a capital custom depicting the humor and spirit of Sir John Macdonald at meeting a familiar figure all battered and lashed. It is the ghost of his "old constitutional reputation," and the premier's announcement of the sorry figure it cuts is real and not feigned.

IN ORDER to encourage teachers' institutes and promote the cause of education, the minister of education has appointed Dr. McLellan, the well-known inspector, an instructor of teachers' institutes. There are twelve such institutes constantly engaged in New York state, and other states have several. The plan has produced good results. Mr. John Smith, M.A., the able headmaster of the St. Catharines college institute, has been appointed to the vacant inspectorate. This is a capital appointment.

A despatch to a New York paper states that there is "much discontent in Ireland over the absence of Mr. Parnell from the recent political meetings. Notwithstanding the respect in which the national king of Ireland is held by the nationalists, the discontent caused by his continued absence from all public demonstrations begins to be freely expressed. His hearers endeavor to smooth matters over by talking about the necessity of rest and recuperation for the leader during the parliamentary recess, but they are privately advising him to show himself from time to time to keep alive the popular enthusiasm."

IT IS REPORTED from Cairo that General Gordon gained a great victory over the rebels on August 11, and that the two rebel leaders were killed. The rebels attempted to capture Khartoum on the 12th, and continued the attack until the 14th, when Gen. Gordon cleverly outflanked them. Many rebels were killed.
