-The central fair grounds are just now covered with an assortment of iron and steel, timbers, plank, tug-rods, handspikes and perspiring workmen consequent on the removal of the stables by Mr. Marshall across the lot. The work will be finished this week.

Obituary. -The death of the late James Gillogley has taken away one of the oldest and most respected residents of the township of Ops. He settled with his wife and family in Ops, about three miles south of Lindsay, where the homestead has been located for years. Although not an active man in municipal matters he was elected and for some time served as township councillor. He was appointed one of the justices of the peace for the county and held the position for many years. His death took place on Wednesday, 3rd inst., and the funeral will leave the homestead on Friday, at 8.30 a. m., and proceed St. Mary's church, Lindsay, thence to the Roman Catholic cemetery.
