The French are pressing operations against the Chinese with considerable vigor. On Wednesday twenty thousand French troops landed at Kipat pass, on the Min river, below Foo Chow, and attacked the Chinese. The latter were defeated with heavy loss, and retreated.

The French vessels were largely outnumbered, but the shells from the French men-of-war did such effective execution that the Chinese were soon compelled to abandon their works, and becoming demoralized on the onslaught of the land forces retreated up the river in confusion.
