REGULATING THE LAKES. - Lakes Sincoe and Conchiching can be so regulated by means of stop-logs that they will neither rise nor fall more than six inches. I have this on the authority of a sound, practical engineer of over thirty years' standing. In this manner the lakes could be kept at low water mark during the months of May, June and July, and during the remaining nine months the farmers would offer no objections to their being kept at least one foot higher, which would be of great benefit to the people of Washago and all owners of vessels on the lakes. By this scheme all parties could be benefited and pleased. excepting Mr. W. P. Christie and the Georgian Bay Lumber Co. HERO'S MACHINE IMPROVED .- The me chanical force of steam appears to have heen understood by Hero 120 years before the present era, but not nearly so well as by our modern engineers. The steam thresher has been introduced here this thresher has been introduced here this year by Messer. D. and C. Armstrong of Janetville, and also by Mr. Johnston of the same place, and they are meeting with much favor. Steam is decidedly a better motive power than horses, and is destined to supersede the latter in this, as it has done in all other cases in which it has been substituted for the work of horses. Steam was first used to work pumpe for draining the English coal mines, and as it was previously known how many horses were viously known how many horses were required to raise a certain amount of coal from a given depth, the power of steam engines were naturally compared to that of horses; hence, an engine which could perform the work of ten horses was called a contract of fan horse tweeter. This perform the work of ten horne was called an engine of ten horne pawer, etc. This term is still used with the name meaning. There is, however, a standard value indicated by the term. By experiments it has been accertained that the average power of the horne working eight hours a day is equal to the raising of \$3,000 lbs. at the pass of one foot revenients. When them rate of one foot per minute. When, therefore, an engine is said to be of so many fore, an engine is said to be of so many horses power it is meant that it is capable of overcoming a resistance equal to the ruising of so many times 35,000 lbs. at the rute of one foot per minute. Thus at engine of ten horse power is capable of raising a lose of 380,000 lbs. one foot per minute. The cause is to be found in the lack of American de mand for lumber. For clear stuff the demand is fair and the price good, but for common lumber the price is not only low, but the demand is very slight, in tact the lower qualities can not be sold at all. This depression will probably be only temporary, and after the close of the presidential contest business will be resumed and a hetter demand arise, but it will be too late to affect this year's operations, and the large firms are acting wisely in shutting down and reducing the season's cut to the lowest point possible. The Georgian Bay Lumber Co. will lessen its out-put of logs to one half its usual quantity, whilst the British Canadian Lumber Co. will close entirely for the season. It may be that in this district the out-put will reach one half of that of last season, but it is quite possible it may not reach more than one third.
