THE SCOTT ACT PETITION STOLEN. - On Monday week a decided sensation was created in Cobourg when it was announced that the discovery had been made that over one thousand names had been puroined from the petition lying in the office of the sheriff praying for the submission of the Scott act in the united counties of Northumberland and Durham. On the 26th September Mr. Wm. Smith, general secretary of the Scott act association, deposited the petition according to law in the office of Sheriff Proctor, there to remain ten days for public inspection before being forwarded to the secretary of state at Ottawa. It bore the signatures of 4,712 bona fide electors of the united counties, five hundred more than the number required. On Monday as Mr. T.T. Bains, a Port Hope barrister, was going through the petition on behalf of certain interested clients, he discovered the abstraction of a number of the petition sheets, and immediately called the attention of the deputy-sheriff, Mr. D. McNaughton, to the fact. The enormity of the theft was soon ascertained. 
