SHANGHIA, Nov. 10.—Chinese mobe have

een committing fearful outrages on

places where Christians worship and on sersons at Canton and interior points of the province. In Kwang Tung alone four Roman Catholic and five Protestant churches were destroyed and 120 houses of resident Christians were looted, the occupants being driven away. In Nam Hot three Catholic chapels, convent and houses were pillaged and the priests and occupants beaten and the women outraged. At Shekung the English chapel was destroyed. The mob tore the clothes from the preacher's wife and shamefully treated her. At Chaut Sung the Wesleyan chapel was destroyed, and Christians are fleeing from the province to Hong Kong. The Chinese gave them the choice to sacrifice to idols or leave their homes. They preferred the latter. Many women were caught by the mob and outraged. Twelve cantonesse and villages have issued notices that all Christians must leave. Fifteen churches in those villages have already been destroyed and several stores looted. Many persons are homeless. Although the attention of the Chinese authorities has been called to these acts they refused notice. At Kitryrung the mob and soldiers destroyed all the Roman Catholic, English and Presbyterian churches. At Swatow the Roman Catholic priests were ordered to leave. After they had left the Chinese soldiers broke into their houses and ravished the female converts. Bagnall, the colporteur of the American bible society, was murdered in the province of Shatung. Produce is in demand but at no marked increase in price.

Wheat in France is now 30c. below the everage for the past thirteen years. A London cable special says:-The stock

of wheat in England is estimated at 1,500,-000 ars., being less than two-thirds of the amount held a year ago. The low prices current here are repelling American imports and thus lightening the stock held by English dealers.

The Mark Lage Express of the 20th of October says:-"Ia fact, good wheat, whether white or red-values being, practically, very nearly equal-is not worth mere than 30s, to the grower, in place. Native wheat has been from the first offered freely at the unprecedentedly low rates current so far during the season; the break in the supply from unfavorable weather for threshing, and now from the exigencies of the seed time, does not afford any reasonable basis for the belief that farmers are holding their wheat for any purpose whatever; the English grower and the foreign grower are competing for ready money with the readiest article at command, which is wheat. At the same time, the United States miller is underselling the laited States miller is underselling both with his manufactured product—flour. And so the trade goes from bad to worse; and there is nothing—absolutely nothing—to show that the worst has come. nothing—to show that the worst has come. Values may be at their lowest, but there is nothing more to prove it than when values were 10s per or higher. The bottom cannot be felt at 30s any more than it could be at 40s, but it must be 10s nearer. The trade for foreign wheat off-stands in London has become completely demoralized. English wheat is intrinsically cheaper than any foreign description, and so long as it. any foreign description, and so long as it is freely offered the foreign bulk is steadily decreasing, but stocks at waterside are

increasing in an equal ratio. British Live Stock Market The Montreal Gazette of Tuesday last says: "The improvement in the British live stock markets, which we chronicled last week, has proven of short duration, and our special cables of to-day's date indicate that a relapse has taken place, the market being weak and lower under heavy supplies and an indifferent demand, which is due principally to the more liberal offerings. Last week the cattle trade had a healthy tone and the improvement promised to be permanent, but the heavy receints of Canadians and Americans along with larger supplies from other sources have effected a radical change, which has resulted in a decline of half a cent per pound without stimulating the demand. At the principal markets to-day the offerings of cattle were heavy and the demand weak at the decline, considerable numbers being left unsold this afternoon. At Liverpool left unsold this afternoon. At Liverpool to-day the supplies were heavy and the market weak, the top figure for prime steers being 14c, against 14½c a week ago, and 13½c two weeks ago. Fair to choice grades were quoted at 13½c; poor to medium at 12½c; and inferior and bulls at 9½c and 11c. There has been renewed depression in the sheep trade owing to excessive supplies and a slow trade. The offerings at their principal markets to-day met with a very slow sale, the trade being weak and values ic per ib. lower. At Liverpool to-day best sheep sold at 14c, against 15c last week. Secondary qualities at 12c and 13½c; merinoes at 11½c and 12½c; and interior and rams at 9c and 10½c. Dressed beef in Liverpool is cabled higher at 5½d, which is the highest price for some weeks.

Montreal Live Steek Market. The exports of live stock continue fair for the advanced stage of the season. Last week 843 head of cattle went out against 833 for the previous week, 179 for the same week in 1883, 662 in 1882, and 306 is 1881.
