Church of England Temperance Society. A meeting of the above society was held in their rooms on Tuesday fortnight. It had been arranged a week or two before that a debate on the Scott act should be given by four gentlemen who had kindly consented to do so. At the hour of eight o'clock the chairman and president of the society (Rev. Mr. Jones) invited Messrs. Campbell and Dunn as speakers in the affirmative, and Messrs. Broad and Allin as speakers in the negative, to take seats on the platform. Owing to the previous announcement that the program would consist of this debate, the speakers were greeted by a crowded plenty. Mr. Broad, the leader of the negative, wished to see the advancement of temperance principles, but argued that the Scott act prevented the onward march of true temperance feeling, as it lacked that moral stamina which should accompany any progressive movement. He shewed the difficulties of the Scott act, and argued that the probabilities of violating the act would be greater, and would be done to a larger extent than at present—the result being a contempt for the law, and consequently the moral standing of the people would be lowered. He assailed the infringement on personal liberty, by stating that legislation should only touch perpetrators of crime, and hence only those who drank to excess should be reached, whereas the act restricted the moderate drinker and drunkperpetrators of crime, and hence only those who drank to excess should be reached, whereas the act restricted the moderate drinker and drunkard alike. He longed for prohibition and thought that moral sussion should educate the public mind to that point when total prohibition would be to them no longer an infringement of their personal liberty, Mr. Dunn in supporting the affirmative in a neat and well worded address asked if the act was not likely to de damage to intemperance why all brewers, distillers and hotel-keepers opposed the act. He contended too that the act was in advance of the present license system, because it removed the great source of the evil, namely, the treating places of resort. He also stated that if liquor was sold in violation of the act it would be done only in vile dens secretly and men of respectability would not resort there. Owing to the penalties being much more severe under the Scott act it would tend to a less likelihood of their being broken, and maintained that if all the temperance people would but unite their efforts the present act could be enforced. He took up the subject of personal liberty, holding that the liberty of the subject ended when the interests of state began. Mr. Allin then continued the argument in fevor of the negative. He argued that never had public feeling advanced so much as in the past four years in favor of temperance, that the space of three or four years was a sufficient time to give the act a fair test, that if the act were a success it would receive at the expiration of that period a more substantial support than when first submitted for that test. He instancgive the act a fair test, that if the act were a success it would receive at the expiration of that period a more substantial support than when first submitted for that test. He instanced seven counties wherein the act had been working and where a test of repeal had been made. He also gave figures showing an increase of drinking in Prince Edward Island since the act came in force and maintained that the happiness of a country could only be estimated, in so far as this act was concerned, by the amount of liquor consumed. He shewed that illicit distilleries would increase under the act and that the country would suffer all the evils of intemperance together with the loss of revenue. At the close of the debate a vote of thanks was unanimously given the gentlemen for their lucid explanation of the greatest moral question of the day. The audience being called on for a decision on the arguments advanced by a small majority thought the affirmative had made out a case. The meeting was brought to a close by Rev. Mr. Jones.
