To the Editor of The Post:

Sir, At the request of a number of the citizens of Tower I write to ask that you publish the following notice. Your paper is taken by Andrew Wilson. One Joseph Harvey was murdered in the vicinity of Tower, Minnesota, on the 2nd day of November last.

His body was placed in an old railway camp near the D. & O. Railway and buried to a depth of about 3 ft. in the earth. The only one who has seen the body since it was buried is that he came from near the village and was about thirty-two years of age and about 5 ft. 6 in. in height and would weigh about 110 pounds.
