COMMERCIAL NEWS.

OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, Jan. 8th, 1886.

A welcome advance in prices of grain and barley has been made this week and the delivery has been free and is still increasing. By reference to our list printed below it will be seen that Scotch wheat brings 85c, and fall and spring wheat from brings 85c, and fall and spring wheat from 75c to 81c. This is an advance of 5c per bushel over last week's quotations. New York, Chicago, and English markets are very firm and rising, though a large advance is not looked for. Barley, too, has shared in the advance, and a considerable quantity was bought on Thursday at prices as high as 60c. In produce, the demand for the Christmas market being past, eggs, butter, turkeys, geese, etc., are a trifle lower in prices.

streal Live Steek Market. Receipts of export cattle at Point St. Charles have been small and mostly on Charles have been small and mostly on through shipment. Few sales have been made on spot and prices may be nominally quoted at 4½ and 5½c per lb. live weight. There is no trade in sheep for export, neither is there any hope for improvement at present, so great is the competition from Australia and New Zealand. Three cents would be a full figure for shippers to pay here. Live hogs were in light supply and firm at 5½c and 5½c per lb. At Viger market the receipts of butchers' cattle were 250 head, for which a good demand was experienced, fair to good grades selling at ic and 5c per lb. live weight, but really choice can command a higher figure. About 150 sheep and lambs were offered, which averaged 3½c per lb. live weight all round.

The Montreal Gazette of Tuesday says:
Our special British cables to-day on the live stock trade report the markets weak and lowerall round with business in a dull and depressed condition. The feature of the week has been the renewed depression in the sheep trade, which has caused a break of one cent per pound in values, which are now down to a very low point, with heavy offerings at all the principal markets. At Liverpool to-day the trade was slow and weak at the decline, and late this afternoon the bulk of the supply was unsold. Best sheep were quoted 12c, against 13c on December 29, and 15c on November 3. Secondary qualities were at 10c and 11c; merinose at 91c and 104c, and inferior and rams at 7c and British Live Stock Market. and 10½c, and inferior and rams at 7c and 8½c. The improvement in the cattle trade noted a week ago has not been sustained, and prices have lost the advance, showing a decline of half a cent. The receipts of Canadians and Americans have continued Canadians and Americans have continued light, but there are very fair offerings of home and other foreign cattle. At Liverpool to-day the demand was slow and uncertain with a weak tone at the decline. Prime Canadian steers were quoted at 13½c, against 14c on December 29, and 13½c on October 27. The lower grades were dull. Fair to choice were at 13c; poor to medium at 12c; and inferior and bulls at 9c and 10½c. These quotations are calculated at 480 in the £. Fresh meats at Liverpool are cabled unchanged, beet at 5½d, and mutton at 5d.
