AN OLD SETTLER GONE.—There died in Cannington on Saturday, January 17th, one of the oldeat settlers in the village or township, Mr. Irvine Johnston, aged eighty-eight years and twenty-four days. He drew twelve hundred acres of land, the most of which was in the neighborhood of the village. Two hundred acres of this land he divided with the settlers coming in. He was a sealous adherent of the Methodist church. He was burled with Orange honors Monday. To the Orange cause he was always a strict adherent. The funeral was headed by the 34th batt. hand and was attended by a large number of sorrowing friends. Among those present were Bro. T. W. Dodd's, Sonys, W.M., L.O.L., No. 664; and Bro. P. McSweyn, district master, Mariposa; Bros. C. D. Johnston, W. Ramesy and Bro. W. Foster, district master, Brock; Bro. Hugh Wilson, county master of North Ontario.
