Early on Friday morning four men were found in a sleigh in a western part of Cincinnati, but one of whom was able to speak. he was dead and the other two were so drunk and nearly frozen as to be unconscious. The dead man's name was Peter Gerher. The party was on a spree. Had they not been discovered at the time all would have perished.

The clothes of the youngest took fire and the two eldest hid themselves under the bed When the mother returned found the child dying.

-A terrible blizzard began on Tuesday on the west coast of Nova Scotia. A large number of fishing craft were overtaken by the storm. Twenty-three skiffs are missing, and many of the survivors are badly frostbitten. One skiff went down in sight with her crew. The crewe of the missing vessels aggregate fifty men. A man named Lewis, who had charge of the explosives, had returned to the engine house after preparing a charge. He had six cartridg-es left over, which he carried in his hands, laying them down on the floor. Through some means unknown they exploded, blowing the engine house to atoms and fearfully manging George Macdonald, Lewis, and a man named Buchanan, who were in the house. It is feared the two former will die. Buchanan is likely to recover. Macdonald is a son of the contractor of the work, Mr. A. P. Macdonald.

-The United States senate Thas taken the earliest opportunity to express its detestation of the dynamite outrage by passing the following resolution:—"That the senate of the United States has heard with indignation and profound sorrow of the attempt to destroy the house of parliament and other public buildings in London and to injure the lives of innocent and unsuspecting persons, and hereby expresses its horror and detestation of such monstrous crimes against civilization." This is a point that poor nations ought to consider well before provoking bigger nations. The strongest battalions are those whose rifles can fire fastest and be relied upon not to break. If they can't afford to get all the latest improvements, they had better keep out of the fight.

-The Philadelphia express on the New Jersey Central railroad was wrecked at Greenville on Saturday morning. The train consisted of four coaches, well filled with passengers. The accident occurred between Danforth avenue station and the cemetery bridge, near Jersey City. The train was running rapidly when a wheel of the forward coach broke, and the car was derailed. It ran into a coal train and was upaet, and the other three cars were wrecked. About seventy passengers were on board, and it is remerkable that not many were killed outright. There were few women on the train, the passengers being mostly business men. Altogether bout twenty passengers were injured, but it is believed none fatally.
