The capacity of the machine is such that twenty-five horse power is sufficient to turn out from two to three tons of dry pulp per day. The woods adapted to this process of making pulp are the soft woods—spruce, pine, fir, hemlock, poplar, in fact all the woods not classed as hard. When it is considered that four hundred pounds of cauliflower seed will under Levorable conditions produce nearly thirteen million plants, which when headed for market and sold at even eight cents per head will produce the sum of three quarters of a million dollars, the value this vegetable has attained in America, where twenty-five years ago it was almost unknown, becomes readily apparent.
