THE RECOUPMENT OF RAIL-A short debais took place in the house of

commons Monday on the question of the recoupment by the Dominion government of Ontario fullway bonuses. The subject was brought up by Mr. Landerkin of Grey, and some vigorous speeches in advocacy of such repayment were made by the Mullen and Caney. A memorial from the county council of Grey, similar to that from the Victoria county council, had in some way miscarried, and Mr. Landerkin wished to find out what had become of it. A large number of county councils have in substance adopted the memorial of our council and forwarded it to Ottawa. The question should receive proper attention this session, and a great wrong will be done to this province if the Outario members fail to press their demands with all the vigor and eloquence in their power. The merits of the case are well known to our readers, having been frequently etated for the council with all the vigor and eloquence frequently etated for the case are well known to our readers, having been frequently etated. The Dominion government, rightly or wrongly, has seenmed control of the local railways, and should, as a simple act of justice, recoup the municipalities in the various sums granted to the roads. Millions have been granted e Queber and to the lower provinces to sid foads similar to those built in Ontario with municipal and provincial funds. As Mr. Allen terms put it : -" Of the bonuses "granted last year 60 per cent. went to "Quebec, 20 per cent. to the maritime pro-"vinces, 10 per cent. to British Columbia, "while Ontario west of Kingston got a "little less than one per cent." The claims and circumstances of the counties of Grey, Weilington, Bruce and Elgin were clearly and forcibly stated by Mesers, Landerkin. McMullen and Casey, and no doubt their statements must have had no little effect on the house and the government. The claims and circumstances of Victoria county are even stronger and more urgent than those of the countles named; and we are surprised and pained to notice that Mr. Dundan did not raise his eloquent voice in advocacy of this very important demand, "One blast upon his bugge horn" would have stirred up the government to prompt and liberal action in the right direction. Our county council unanimously passed the memorial. Recognizing the importance of the question and the equity of the claim they cordially united without political distinction or feeling in pressing their claims upon the Dominion govern-

In view of the very large sums granted last session to the lower provinces, can there be any hesitation in pressing this matter with all vigor on the Dominion myerment? The Dominion should, as a notat of fair play to Ontario, assume our municipal bonuess, as well as the provindal grants to the failways, the control of which they have taken in hand. By so doing the relief to our musicipalities would be considerable. Mr. Dundas owes is to the interested municipalities in South Victoria to see that nothing is left undence to secure this equitable claim. We might say that Mr. Hector Cameron owes it to the interested municipalities in North Victoria to diach arms effectively his pists duty now regarded as the representative of anything but himself. POOR GORDOWS FATE.
