THE RIEL REBELLION. THE DUCK LARS FIGHT.

Grievances of the Half-Breeds as Indians.

Official Mismanagement and Dis honesty. The Timber and Land Grabbers.

Campaign notes and Incidents. THE COMMENCEMENT OF THE RE-

WINNIPES, April 3.-William Howie of High Bluff, Manitoba, who returned yesterday from the seat of troubles, has been further interviewed. He started from here three months ago with his brother with a team and sieigh, proposing to reach the team and sieigh, proposing to reach the crossing by the opening of spring to work in on land, as Matthews had a large farm there along the trail from Troy to the crossing. They did some freighting for the Dominion government and they were living on the farm when the trouble in the settlement commenced about three weeks ago. Riel two weeks ago with a gang of four hundred men declared war and started on a marguding expedition. Before starting he addressed a large meeting of half-breeds in the Cathelic church near Batoche's crossing. Howe was present, but could not understand as Riel spoke in French. He advised all to srm themselves and pre-He savised all to srm themselves and prepare for a fight as it was evident justice could be secured by no other method. The next day Angus McIntosh, a white settler at Batoche's crossing, Dr. Willoughby of Saskatoen and one Welsh from near Duck lake took dinner with Riel, when he told them the time had arrived to fight and that he would either rule or perish. While at dinner Riel's band came up, when Riel, after warning the settlers, joined his companions. The first unlawful acts committed by the rebels were breaking into a settlement store kept by George Carr and also sacking a store kept by Walters & Baker opposite the side river. In all cases the rebels took what goods they found and then made prisoners of the storekeepers. then made prisoners of the storekeepers. The object of the rebels was to strike at oned all the government as they imprisoned all the government officials and clerks they could lay hands on. Riel sent couriers up to White Cap to have his band join them. He said he was going to clean out the white settlement at Prince Albert. They had fifty prisoners, all whites, locked up in the Catholic church sear Batoche crossing before Howie left on the 20th of March.

Howie further says that Riel's half-breed followers have 150 repeating rifles, while the Indians are armed with shot guns.
