Public attention is so deeply engaged in the North-western and Alaska questions that the regular parliamentary proceedings at Ottawa attract comparatively slight notice. Sir John Macdonald has to the surprise and mortification of many of his supporters completely backed down on his license act. He suddenly seemed to accept the measure of Mr. Cameron of Huron, of course thereby abandoning his own pet scheme, which has occasioned so much trouble, expense and annoyance. Score one more for Mr. Mowat.

There is an universal demand for the dismissal of Gov. Dewdney, who is considered one of the principal authors of the North-west trouble. The feeling against Dewdney is so strong among conservatives as reformers. The evidence against him is so strong that it cannot be ignored. In order to give our readers an idea of the feeling and impressions which rightly or wrongly prevail in the North-west, we make the following extracts from a letter received from a gentleman living at Fort Qu'Appelle and who is thoroughly informed as to what is going on in the interior of the government provinces.

It is well known that the Methodist mission is a large organization of men throughout the world, and that the great aim of the mission is to spread the Christian religion. This aim is carried out in various ways, and one of the most important is the establishment of schools. These schools are not only for the purpose of teaching the children of the mission, but also for the purpose of teaching the children of the surrounding population.

The Prince of Wales has been "aluminate" in Dublin, doing Killarney, attending the races at Punchestown, holding receptions, dancing, and having a good time generally in Ireland. The aristocratic princess makes hosts of friends. There has been some demonstrations on the part of the nationalists, but the visit has been a great success. The "Outset rebellion" has formed a singular and exciting phase of the North-west trouble. Col. Outset, of the 68th regt., also an M.P., left his regiment at Calgary, and proceeded to Ottawa and Montreal. At various times outward he mysteriously vanished "from and slanders," not against the rebels but against the government on account of the incomplete equipment of his battalion and general mismanagement in the North-west. He indicated that when he reached his place in parliament he would make a full and frank report on the North-west. A later announcement states that Col. Outset is "seriously ill" in Montreal, and that his physicians have forbidden his return to the North-west.

RUSSIA AND ENGLAND. The Novoe Vremya says the war cloud is advancing. The Russians are compelling the Serbs to build a military road through the Pezda district in the Balkans. It is reported that Russia is purchasing in England, through London merchants, chain armor for gunboats. A Vienna paper hints that while Lord Dufferin and the secret were leading Russian troops were conducting the Algonquin from their allegiance. A Vienna telegram states that the Austrian chief has sent a deputation to Gen. Komaroff to announce their submission. The chief thinks Afghanistan is lost to England. The Moscow Gazette says unless England surrenders the occupation of Port Hamilton will be inevitable. Lord Dufferin's attitude, it says, is also a sufficient cause.

The Russian corvette Hayak and the British cruiser Garnet arrived at Norfolk, Va., Monday, from the West Indies. The immediate construction of two belt cruisers has been ordered on the Clyde. This practically revives ship-building on the river and has already furnished employment for 3,000 men. It is stated that Russia now declines to enter into a distinct and definite obligation to do so on account of the difficulty of the boundary commission. The Vienna Politische correspondent states that the real points of the difficulty between England and Russia are the British claims in the Arctic and the Russian claims in the Pacific.
