At eleven o'clock the watch saw what appeared like a fog bank on the starboard bow, On suspicion of danger, the helm was set hard a-starboard and the engines reversed. At that moment the officers realized that, instead of a fog bank, the ship was just about to crash into a monater leaberg. The engines were ordered full speed astern, but, almost before the order could be carried out, the fore the order could be carried out, the Dracons struck the berg with a tremendous crash, while going almost at full speed, and sustained the damage already indicated. From the violence of the colision the captain and the crew imagined that the ship would go down in a few minutes, and instant preparations were made to launch the boats. But while the steamer was slowly drifting back from the glittering mountain of ice the captain discovered that the ship was making no water and that the damage was all before the collision bulkhead. Being a new steel ship, the plates had not broken, but simply bent and doubled in, forming a kind of breakwater for the bulkhead. The captain lay to until daylight, when the steamer was found to be surrounded by bergs. The officers say there were hundreds of them, and the scene was a most majestic one.
