No notice of this dis-tress was ever given, nor was any one left. tress was ever given, nor was any one left in charge of the goods. After the landlord and builif had left the premises the tenant locked the goods up. The balliff advertised but could not sell on the day of sale on account of not having possession. The sale was adjourned for a week when the sale was adjourned for a week when the bailiff not possession and sold. There was no appraisement of the goods before sale. o persons were asked by the baliff to value the goods, but they were not sworn as the law requires. The goods were sold for about \$60. The tenant proved the goods to be worth about \$130. The judge directed the jury that the sale was illegal by reason of their being no sworn appraisers. British Live Steck Trade. There has been a material improvement in the condition of the British live stock trade during the past week and our special cables of Monday chronicle an advance of about one cent per lb. as compared with a week ago. The improvement has been due chiefly to a considerable fall-ing off in the receipts, which has reduced the supply sufficiently to give sellers a decided ad-vantage. Receipts from Canada and the United States have been light, while the supplies from States have been light, while the supplies from Ireland and the centinent have continued small. Buyers were more anxious to operate, which strengthened the market and to-day the tone was firm under a steady demand, which effected a good clearance at the advance. Our Liverpool cable, says the Market airm and demand satisfactory, the offerings being light. Prices were it per lb. higher than a week ago. Prime Canadian steers had a good sale on the basis of 14-c. Fair to choice grades were quoted at 14c, poor to medium at 13c, and inferior and bulls at 10c to 114. These quotations are calculated at \$4.80 in the 2. Dressed beef in Liverpool is cabled firm at 14d to 14d, against 14d a week ago, and 14d two weeks ago.

Montreal Live Stock Market.

Montreal Live Stock Market. The export of cattle from Montreal continues to keep ahead of all previous years. The exports to date reach 18,325 head -an increase of 4,265 head over 1834, of 2.925 over 1883, an increase of 6,394 over 1882. The exports from Boston last week were 1.038 head. There has been a fair trade in export cattle since our last, and the market has been well cleared out at firm prices. The receipts during the week have included some grass fed cattle, and the movement or such next week is expected to show a large in crease. At Point St. Charles Monday morning such next week is expected to show a large increase. At Point St. Charles Monday morning exporters were good buyers and the bulk of the offerings were absorbed, with the tone of the market firm, transactions being effected at 5½ to 5½ per lb. live weight. Last year at this date export cattle sold at 5½ to 6½ c, and in 1883 at 6½ to 7½ c. There was a good demand for butchers' cattle at 5c to 5½ per lb., live weight. Hogs were in light supply and fair demand, with prices higher at 5½ to 5½ per lb. At Viger market Monday the receipts of cattle were moderate and prices ruled firm under a good demand. There were 200 head offered and good to choice beeves brought from ½ to 5½ c, and common to fair 3½ to ½ c per lb, live weight. The receipts of sheep and lambs were 300 head, the best of which sold at \$4.50, while inferior brought \$2.50 each. Lambs sold at \$3.75 to \$4 as to quality. Calves were in good demand at easier prices, their being 200 head offered and choice sold at \$10, while inferior sold down as low as \$1.50 each. Hogs were active at steady prices and brought from \$3.50 to \$8.50 according to quality. One bull, weighing 1,965 lbs., sold at 5½c.—




