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THE MARCH TO ONION LAKE. | LOCAL NEWS-LETTERS

take following matter:
On Wednesday afternoon, an hour or two after Col. Herchmer and Col. Boulton arrived with their cavalry, the 65th were preparing, with unfeigned rejoicing, to march to Fort Pitt on their way home. With a suddenness which seems to characterize most of the decisions arrived at in this most of the decisions arrived at in this war, a counter-order came from Gen. Middleton to the effect that the 65th and the 92nd, with the rest (a very small "rest") of Gen. Strange's column, were to march at once to Onion lake, on their way northward. So the horses' heads were turned, and the calvacade moved off in the direction of the north pole instead of Montreal. Starting out in a furious storm of rain, we soon found water beneath as well as all round us. Now a march had to be crossed, now a creek to be forded. Unaware of or disregarding the order to embark on waggess for these semi-nautical exploits, most of the men walked stoically through mud and water, trusting to a spell of dry weather and dry trail to restore dryness to wet feet.

It was too late to make more than a few miles the first day, so we encamped by the side of one of those innumerable lakes which occupy—so to speak—a great portion of the dry land. Off went the horses, released from harness and saddles, and and took a refreshing roll on the turf before the herders took charge of them for the night. Up go the tents in groups outside the great corral of waggons, and we put in the night very well.

On Thursday we resumed our march. Scarcely any incident occurred that day. On one point we came across a grave, and some of the 92nd unearthed a dead squaw and removed a box of her belongings that had been buried with her. Our guides led us half a dozen miles out of our way—as we found out afterwards—but we got on past the few deserted houses at Onion lake, and reached the northern end of Frog lake, a magnificent sheet of water, by lunch time the following day. In spite of the drifting rain, many of us made the melanchely tour of the scene of that most atrpcious massacre. Here, within a fence, beside an elevated bell, was a large square hole, containing a few scrape of iron and much burned clay—all that remains of Father Fafard's mission church. In the same cellar had been found those blackenfragments which had been transferred to the little churchyard near and now rest under four little mounds and four rough wooden crosses. Three or four hundred yards away in a scrubby piece of bush, and some distance from each other, were the bodies of Gilchrist and Williscraft, under the scant covering hastily thrown over them by our scouts a few weeks ago. Six of the eight murdered men had been accounted for. As I stood looking into another exposed cellar, which apparently contained nothing but burnt debris, Mr. Halpine, for some time compulsory secretary to Chief Big Bear, remarked, "Do you see those files coming out of the holes? IN THE COURT OF APPEAL.—The court of appeal gave judgment recently in the case of the Canadian Land & Emigration Co. vs. the township of Dysart, dismissing the plaintiffs' appeal from the chancery division. This action was brought, as will be remembered, to restrain the enforcement of an assessment for taxes on the plaintiffs' lands in the township of Dysart, on the ground that a gross overvaluation of the ground that a gross overvaluation of the lands was made by the assessor and con-firmed by the court of revision. The defendants demurred ore tenus at the trial, saying that the facts alleged gave no ground saying that the facts alleged gave no ground of action, the plaintiffs' proper course being to appeal from the court of revision to the atipendiary magistrate. The plaintiffs' case in this regard was that the members of the court of revision, who are parties to the action, had acted fraudulently, and that fraud was a ground for relief against their jpdgment. The demurrer, was, however, allowed, and the action dismissed. Chief Justice Hagarty in giving judgment in appeal said: -"I have not been able to satisfy myself that the charges brought by the appellants against the court of revision or its individual members are sufficient to bring ing when he was shot. Apart from the delay in this case into another year, if their action be set aside, are the same men to do the thing over again, to go through the form of hearing the appeal from the assessment? If their minds had been so made up against this company as this bill asserts, would it not be an almost useless form to require them again to hear it?
