The Canadian Lost.

Mair a mile on the Esplanade in ashes On Monday moraing about 12.30 o'clock a fire started in the large brick building on the esplanade at the foot of Frederick-st., known as the Grape sugar refinery. At twenty minutes past twelve Constable Trotter, No. 86, whose beat lay along the esplanade and neighboring streets, passed the building and noticed nothing wrong.
He marched along his beat up Sherbournest, until he reached Front-st. At this corner he looked around. In less time than it takes to state the facts the whole of the upper storeys had been enveloped in flames already raging and roaring. The esplanade, both east and west of this place, was occupied by frame buildings, a large number of them boathouses and boat-builders' establishments. Showers of sparks fell among these, like so many tinder-boxes, and a score of fires commenced in a line west from the place of starting. In ten minutes from the time the alarm was given the whole of the grape sugar building was a mass of flames. It was impossible for the fremen to approach the factory, and all the streams the brigade could have turned on would have been useless. The wind and flames combined made a tawnide wind and flames combined made a terrific roar, which continued without intermission. The fire roared defiance and continsion. The fire roared defiance and continued to spread. In the slip alongside the schooner Annie Mulvey was lying, and in a few seconds was wrapped around with fire. Cars of lumber standing along the esplanade broke out in several places, and the boat houses near by were doomed at once. Despair was pictured in the faces of the onlookers, now numbering thousands. In the meantime buildings along a couple of blocks westward were on fire, Every few seconds a crash of falling bricks told that another part of the sugar factory had come down, and on the blaze went westward, threatening to consume the whole of the seplanade.

Immediately west of the sugar refinery the schooner Annie was lying. It was the work of a moment for the flames to catch the vessel in their hot and destructive embrace. The masts and rigging almost melted at the fervent heat. On board were Captain Uglow and the crew, who were in imminent peril. The noise woke the captain, and the crew, comprising three men, were called and hastened to the deck, W. McCallum had his head badly burned, and he and the other members of the crew were carried by some people on the adjoining dock to an hotel near oy. McCallum's condition was considered to be very dangerous and medical aid was immediately summoned. The other sailors received slight injuries.

As the flames swept further westward thay consumed a row of boathouses. The first to go was Thomas Saulter's best forms.

Then followed in quick succession boat houses belonging to the following: Messrs. Evans, S. R. Heskes and J. Gunsell. In most cases some of the contents were removed. Meanwhile the wind had shifted slightly to the north, and the fire-brande were sent harmless out into the hey. The end of Elias Rogers' coal wharf caught fire, and slowly the fames were crawling up to the lumber and sheds. When the lumber was reached the headway of the fire was more than doubled. At the foot of George-st. on a wharf stood a long row of buildings, the front one of which was known as Taylor's elevator. At the end of the row Graham's icehouse stood. It was soon ignited, and with the surrounding sheds added fuel to the flames. The schooners Mary Ann and Madeline were moored at the wharf. Desperate efforts were made to get the Mary Ann out into the bay. A sail was hoisted but soon, however, caught fire, and the vessel had to be deserted to the devouring element, which consumed it in a few minutes. Steele Bros. stables were burned to cinders. Three horses which were in the stables were removed in time to escape being burned to death.

When the flames reached Joseph Adamson's plaster shops their velocity was increased. The wind, which for a brief period had veered to the north, again went round to the east, and blew the flames on to Chapman & Co.'s buildings, which burnt with fury till completely destroyed. Wm. At Church-st. wharf the pleasure steamers Mazeppa and Ontario were moored. The Ontario had steam up and was trying to tow out the Mazeppa. A schooner, however, blocked the way, and it seemed as if all three vesals. were doomed.

The destruction of property is roughly estimated at \$1,000,000, the grape sugar factory alone being valued with contents at \$120,000. The building is insured in Canadian companies for \$40,000 and the stock in American companies for \$30,000.

Between Scott and Church-ats, only some three buildings escaped destruction, viz: Mrs. Grieve's boathouse at the foot of Scott-at, the Toronto Stone Company's works, and the Bayside rowing club building. All of these buildings had a very narrow escape from being consumed.
