EVENTS OF THE WEEK.

Letters from Saskin say the troops there are dying fast. Sir Leonard Tilley's health is improving slowly but surely. A fearful state of anarchy prevails in Kordofan, where a famine also exists. It is reported the Russians are endeavoring to stir up the followers of Ayoub Khan to revolt. British officers in India are being granted short holidays, and are being allowed to visit home. The French revenue returns show that the recent protective legislation has failed to exclude foreign sugars. The decree ordering the general election in France has been issued designating October 14th as the day. The force of Abyssinian troops sent by King John has relieved the garrison of 400 at Jarri, south of Kassaia. The number of saloons in Ohio has been reduced one-half since the Scott (high license) law went into effect in that state. The czar and czarina started for Copenhagen Tuesday, having just completed a tour of Finland, on which they met with a series of ovations. Smallpox is declared to be an epidemic in Montreal. There are now 36 cases in the city hospital. Four deaths occurred on Tuesday in the suburbs. Edward Belmont, while attempting a double somersault at the circus at Lan Amburg's circus at Medina, N.Y., alighted on the ground and received fatal injuries. Cholera and dysentery are causing great ravages among the Russian troops on the Afghan frontier, especially at Pendergast, where Russian infantry and 16,000 cavalry are now in the trans-Caspian territory. The Irish home rule members of parliament are arranging to give a grand banquet at the city of Dublin on August 24th, to celebrate the recent parliamentary triumph of the Irish party. Major Chernish telegraphs that the rebels in the north have attacked Alcedon, fifty miles east of Kassaia, and were routed with the loss of seven sheikhs and 370 men. The Kassaia garrison is famishing. A camp exercise in which fifty thousand troops will participate will be held at Lahore, India, probably at Christmas. The government is earnestly considering the question of reorganization of the native army. A horrible ball fight took place on Sunday in the old Roman amphitheatre of Nimes, in the department of Gard, in France, which resulted in the butchery of several persons and the injury of Emmanuella, the famous torreador. As a result of the Pall Mall Gazette revelation, several cheap lodging-houses for work girls have been established in the east end of London. One establishment a girl can obtain a bed, three meals, and a warm bath for eighteen cents. Considerable excitement has been caused among the people of Fort Erie by the appointment of Mr. Whelan as United States consul, and efforts are being made to induce the Dominion authorities to reject him. Montreal is still suffering severely from the depopulation of our city, which seem to enjoy complete immunity. Between last Friday afternoon and Sunday midnight no fewer than four burials have been taken in view, which not a single arrest has been made. Extensive preparations are being made for the meeting of the czar and emperor of Austria, which takes place shortly at Krasnaya Polyana, in the Caucasus.
