It was the principal attraction of the outside part, and was very creditable. The judges no doubt had much difficulty in awarding the red tickets. Care should be taken in all these exhibi-tions not to let local favoritism creep in. Whenever this feeling betrays itself it should be stamped out as it is discouraging to exhibitors and impairs future prospects. We make these remarks in a general sense, for the benefit of all shows and societies. There never was a show yet but some one would be dissatisfied and some

one would impugn the decision of the judges. The fine course prepared by the Trotting Park Association gave a capital opportunity for the display of roadsters, drivers, carriage horses, and for trotting. This part of the show was admirably managed in the main by Mr. H. Wilson, Mr. W. G. Smith and Mr. J. A. Urquhart. The judges were Capt. Hughes of Toronto, Mr. R. A. Shepherd of Sutton, and Mr. Donald McKay of Saintfield. Capt. Hughes is an officer of the Queen's Own and was with that gallant regiment at the Cut Knife Hill engagement, where he distinguished himself.
