WAR LIKE PREPARATIONS. CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 30.-Indications to-day point to active war preparations by the Porte. Eighty battalions of first-class reserves are being mobilized in the districts bordering on the Black Sea at points which facilitate their transportation for dury in Roumelia in the event of the Sultan being compelled to adopt extreme measures to settle the Roumelian diffimeasures to settle the Roumelian difficulty. The transportation department is actively engaged in furnishing means for the concentration of troops at the most available points for an advance on Roumelia. Thirty battalions of infantry and a company of artillery estationed on the inland company of artillery, stationed on the island of Crete, have been ordered to Adrianople.

THE TURKS DEFEATED. Yesterday the Turkish troops fired on the Roumelian outposts at Mustapha Pass, twenty miles north-west of Adrianople. The outposts were immediately reinforced, and a skirmish ensued, in which the Turks were defeated and forced to retire and carry with them a number of wounded.

THE FIGHTING CONTINUES. BELGRADE, Sept. 30.—The Turks have occupied Djokouriza. The insurgents refuse to accept the government's terms, and fighting continues. It is reported the Arnauts at Deranje, and the Biellolje on the frontier of Montenegro have revolted. RUSSIA'S OPPOSITION TO PRINCE ALEX-

ANDER. M. de Giers, the foreign minister, is pressing the powers to make the deposing of Prince Alexander a leading proposition at the meeting. The czar favors the candidature of Prince Waldemar. The con-sensus of opinion at European centres is that the conference at Constantinople will prove a failure. If Roumelia is satisfied, Greece, Servia and other countries will require compensation, thus re-opening the

Turkish troops on the roumelian fron-TIER.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 30.- The sultan is impatient at the inaction of the powers in reference to his protest and circular, and he has decided upon the immediate concentration of Turkish troops along the Roumelian frontier within easy march of Philippopolis. The forces at Salonica and Adrianople will be strengthened immediately, and troops are now marching from Smyrna. It is estimated that 6,000 Turks now face 5,000 Bulgarians on the frontier.
