The charge was brought under the statute, clause 30. 47 Vic., chap. 34, which provices that: Any licensed person who allows to be supplied on his licensed premises, by purchase or otherwise, any description whatever of liquor to any person apparently under the age of sixteen years, of either sex, not being resident on the premises or a bonafide guest or lodger, shall, as well as the person who actually gives or supplies the liquor, be liable to pay a penalty of not less than ten dollars and not exceeding twenty dollars for every such offence.
