Cox of Peterboro, ex-president of the Midland railway, who, we understand, has commenced farming and is going into the breeding of Durhams. We certainly must congratulate him on making such a good relection to start with, and by care and good management in a few years his herd will give a good account of themselves. A recent sale has been made to Mr. J. R. Proctor, Beaverton, of their yearling buil, which was at the head of her i of calves that took second prize at Toronto exhibi-tion. This same call at Peterboro won first prize, beating the one that got first prize in Toronto. Mr. Proctor was certainly fortu-nate in securing this fine animal both for his individual merit and also his fashionable breeding. The dam was a heifer that Mesers.
