The magistrate held the prisoner guilty and imposed a fine of \$10 in the case of George Curtis and \$10 in the case of Ellen Jane Curtis, and in default two months in goal. He also bound the prisoner over to keep the peace, placing the bond to be given at \$1,000, himself at \$250 and two others at \$250 each.
