Stavenson, commander of the British forces in Egypt, who recently arrived there with large reinforcements, attacked the rebels who had been menacing the garrison for several weeks. Three hours fight ensued, resulting in the British troops capturing Ginies, a village near Kosek. The rebels were completely routed, cavalry is pursuing the enemy.
